Reaction to the Government's Integrated Rail Plan: Joint Statement from East Midlands Councils and Transport for the East Midlands

The publication this week of the Government's long anticipated Integrated Rail Plan (IRP) is an important milestone. The IRP is a crucial document which will provide the basis for major rail investment in the East Midlands over the next 30 years.



The East Midlands HS2 Executive Board and Transport for the East Midlands (TfEM) will meet over the coming weeks to consider the IRP in detail.

However, it is recognised that the IRP contains a number of positive commitments for the East Midlands that would deliver billions of pounds of new investment and start to address long standing problems of under-funding and improve some key journey times earlier than might otherwise be expected.

In particular:

- A commitment to deliver HS2 connectivity from Birmingham to the East Midlands (Derby, Nottingham and Chesterfield) and Midland Main Line electrification (including through Leicester)
- Commitment to a package of investment on the East Coast Mainline including removal of flat crossings and junctions (such as at Newark)
- Recognition of the importance of investing in Toton (with the potential for HS2 connectivity) to the wider East Midlands Development Corporation and East Midlands Freeport propositions.
- Recognition of the importance of investing in Chesterfield to the Northern Derbyshire Growth Zone.
- Recognition of the need to improve rail services between Mansfield-Leicester-London via the Maid Marion and Robin Hood lines.

Clearly much more work will be required to implement these and other proposals in the IRP. In particular:

- Connecting HS2 to the Midland Main Line will raise significant capacity issues on the existing rail network and at Derby and Nottingham Stations which will need to be addressed in a collaborative manner with local leaders, and with minimum disruption to existing passengers and freight operators.
- A final decision about how best to extend HS2 connectivity northwards must be made quickly in order to
 minimise additional blight for local communities, and in collaboration with local leaders in the East Midlands,
 Yorkshire and the North East to ensure that the local economic and environmental impacts of investment
 choices are properly understood by Government.

Local leaders in the East Midlands remain convinced that full delivery of the Eastern Leg of HS2 as originally proposed is the best way to connect the towns and cities of the Midlands and the North, address transport poverty and 'level up' the eastern side of Britain – and will continue to work with colleagues in Yorkshire and the North East to make the case for this investment.

Infrastructure, Planning & Housing

£360 million investment to transform rail ticketing across the country - Contactless pay-as-you-go ticketing to be rolled out across the commuter networks of the Midlands and North over the next 3 years [details <u>here</u>].

- £360 million invested to radically reform and overhaul rail passengers' experience of fares, ticketing and retailing
- contactless tap-in and tap-out ticketing to be at more than 700 stations across the country outside London and the South East with 400 stations across the North set to benefit
- investment marks first stage of plan to roll out convenient and modern digital ticketing across the whole rail network, improving thousands of daily commutes and simplifying journeys

HCLG Committee launches inquiry into regulation of social housing in England - The Housing, Communities and Local Government (HCLG) Committee launches an inquiry examining the quality and regulation of social housing in England [details here. The HCLG Committee will examine concerns about the quality of social housing, with a focus on the ability of the Regulator of Social Housing and the Housing Ombudsman to identify and address problems. The inquiry will also focus on the proposals in the Government's social housing White Paper aimed at improving the regulatory regime.

Midlands Engine

Accelerating the Midlands journey to net zero - For over 18 months more than 300 partners and parliamentarians, along with many more leading voices in the Midlands, have worked together to co-create our region's first unified vision for accelerating towards net zero.

The <u>Ten Point Plan for Green Growth in the Midlands Engine</u> sets out Midlands Engine's region's priority actions and opportunities around this urgent and vital issue. It details how Midlands Engine will support the government on levelling up, net zero, nature's recovery, post-COVID and post-EU Exit economic growth. Working in partnership, the plan aims to create a 36% reduction in carbon emissions, 196,000 jobs and a £24.2 billion boost for our economy, all by 2041 [details here].

Migration, Asylum Support and refugee resettlement

Ministers questioned on Channel crossings and Afghan resettlement scheme - The Home Affairs Committee takes evidence on two inquiries: Channel crossings, migration and asylum-seeking routes through the EU and Afghanistan: safe routes and resettlement held this week.

In the first session, Home Office Minister for Tackling Illegal Migration, Tom Pursglove MP, faced questions on the rise in the numbers of people attempting to enter the UK by crossing the Channel in small boats.

In the second session Minister for Afghan Resettlement, Victoria Atkins MP, responded to questions on Government progress in establishing safe asylum routes from Afghanistan [details <u>here</u>].

Employers' Information

Over 100,000 young careers boosted by Kickstart Scheme - Over 100,000 young people across the country have now started jobs through the government's landmark Kickstart Scheme, it was announced this week [details here]. Kickstart Scheme, Update and Support Available - EMC's work is well underway as a gateway organisation for the Kickstart Scheme. EMC can also provide the employability training that is a feature of the scheme, and which is also fully funded. Development is structured throughout the placement, so that participants understand what employers look for in effective employees to maximise the time at work and develop key skills such as teamworking and communication. Tailored training and coaching can also be provided if required. The development is provided through virtual or in-person sessions, depending on the preference of the councils. The employability training can also be provided to organisations that have not accessed Kickstart through EMC as the gateway.
