The Levelling Up and Regeneration Bill

Announced during the Queen's Speech this week. The Bill will add to existing legislation by:

- Making it easier to devolve powers to more of England through a new type of combined authority model— "combined county authorities" - to be made up of upper tier local authorities (county councils and unitary authorities) only.
- Simplifying the processes for establishing and amending new and existing combined authorities
- Increasing the accountability and transparency of local leaders to their communities, in line with local areas getting more powers and flexibilities. This will include supporting attendance at overview and scrutiny and audit committees through amending remuneration provisions.
- Enabling local authorities to change their governance model to a stronger form (e.g., with a directly elected mayor) more quickly in order to access a deeper devolution deal.
- Allowing areas to choose an alternative title for their directly elected mayor such as 'Governor' and 'County Commissioner' so areas can choose the title which best reflects their local identity.

In addition, the Bill provides a framework within which power can sustainably be devolved locally by providing supporting tools to tackle excessive risk from borrowing and investing. This allows local authorities to do the capital investment needed, in a way that is financially sustainable both now and in the future.

Levelling Up, measures include:

- Creating a legal duty for the government to set and report on a number of missions for levelling up the country.
- These missions will include: closing the gap in pay and productivity between the richest and poorest areas, effectively eradicating child illiteracy and innumeracy, closing gaps in healthy life expectancy, getting the rest of the country's transport connectivity much closer to the standards of London's
- The deadline for each mission is 2030, but the Levelling Up Bill will create a duty for the government to report on progress annually.
- Enabling more areas to have the kinds of devolved powers which currently only the largest cities enjoy, helping drive improvements on local priorities such as transport and skills.

• New provisions on council borrowing to protect taxpayers' money while enabling local areas to make investment.

Regeneration, measures include:

- New powers for local leaders to run High Street Rental Auctions
- Councils will also be able to double council tax on empty and second homes
- 'Al-fresco dining' will be made permanent
- A new, locally set infrastructure levy, charged on the final value of property when its sold, will replace much of the broken S106 payments system.

• Legislation to make it easier for councils to regenerate their town centres through Compulsory Purchase Orders

The Queen's Speech

On Tuesday 10 May, during the State Opening of Parliament, His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales, on behalf of Her Majesty The Queen, set out the Government's agenda for the 2022-23 Parliamentary session.

Great British Railways will have contracting powers for passenger services and will be tasked with retaining the best of the private sector to drive improvements to services. The new body will work within a clear mandate, goals and budgets set by the Government, who will reserve powers of direction.

Asylum Support and Refugee Resettlement

Changes to Asylum Dispersal - The Home Office recently confirmed that all Local Authority areas will be within scope as asylum dispersal areas. This is a significant change of approach. The Full Dispersal model aims to end the use of contingency hotels and reduce pressure on the limited number of areas that are already dispersal areas. As part of the consultation process, councils are invited to agree how the model for dispersal will operate. EMC (through its SMP role) will be working with councils and the Home Office in developing and agreeing the approach. New role for Chief Executive Anthony May - Chief Executive of Nottinghamshire County Council, Anthony May has been appointed the Chief Executive of the Nottingham University Hospitals NHS Trust (NUH) and will take up his new role in the Autumn [details <u>here]</u>.

Derby City Council's children's services are officially 'Outstanding' - Derby has become one of only three cities in the country to be rated 'Outstanding' for its services for children and young people, following an inspection by Ofsted. Services were judged to be Outstanding in three out of four categories, including overall effectiveness. The Council also earned this accolade for the impact of leaders on social work practice with children and families, and the experiences and progress of children who need help and protection. It was rated Good for the experiences and progress of children in care and care leavers.

The Ofsted report highlights the progress made over the last five years, where the service's practitioners have embraced a new model of working, which is commended as 'a significant achievement' during the COVID-19 pandemic and lockdowns in 2020.

Annual Council Meeting results in change of political leadership - Rutland's Annual Council Meeting has resulted in a change of political leadership after Council Leader Oliver Hemsley (Independent) stood down. He was replaced by Lucy Stephenson (Conservative), who was elected by a majority of 18 Councillors [details <u>here]</u>.

Birmingham 2022 Queen's Baton Relay to visit the region as full England route revealed - The Birmingham 2022 Commonwealth Games has unveiled the highly-anticipated route that the Queen's Baton Relay will take through England this summer. Birmingham 2022 is hosting the 16th official Queen's Baton Relay – a journey which brings together and celebrates communities across the Commonwealth, during the build up to the Games. In England, the Queen's Baton Relay will provide the opportunity for communities to experience the buzz and excitement for Birmingham 2022, as the 11 days of showstopping sport nears ever closer.<u>The England Route (birmingham2022.com)</u> The Birmingham 2022 Queen's Baton Relay is confirmed to visit the region during its final journey through England, taking place over 2 days:

- 10 July Northampton, Corby, Oakham, Leicester, Nottingham, Lincoln
- 11 July Skegness, Boston, Grantham, Loughborough, Derby, Bakewell, Matlock, and Buxton
