Thirty towns to share £725 million to help communities 'build back better'

Government announced £725 million funding for 30 towns in England to boost their local economies, create jobs and help them 'build back better' from the pandemic [details <u>here</u>].

Homelessness

Social investment pilot to fund over 200 homes for rough sleepers - Rough Sleeping and Housing Minister Eddie Hughes announces partnership with Big Society Capital that will see a total of £30 million invested in new homes for rough sleepers.

- £15 million government grant to help deliver over 200 homes for rough sleepers
- Social investor Big Society Capital to match grant with £15 million of its own funding
- The pilot will fund homes across England with a particular focus in London, Greater Manchester and in Teesside

The 3 year pilot, which will run until 2024, will see £15 million of government funding combined with an additional £15 million provided by Big Society Capital, a leading social impact investor, to deliver over 200 move-on homes for rough sleepers and those at risk of homelessness [details <u>here</u>].

Migration, Asylum Support and Refugee Resettlement

Plans to bring vulnerable Afghan interpreters to the UK accelerated - Local staff who worked for the UK Government in Afghanistan, including many who worked as interpreters for UK forces in the country, will be eligible for expedited relocation to the UK under the Afghan Relocation and Assistance Policy (ARAP), the Defence Secretary and Home Secretary announced on 1st June 2021.

Following the decision to begin the withdrawal of military forces from Afghanistan, the Prime Minister has agreed the Ministry of Defence, Home Office and MHCLG to rapidly accelerate applications through the policy. ARAP was first introduced to help vulnerable Afghans, who risked their lives supporting British troops, to relocate to the UK and start new lives.

The ARAP scheme came into effect on 1 April 2021 and offers the relocation of current and former local staff in Afghanistan, including interpreters and their immediate families. This new scheme acknowledges and reflects that the situation in Afghanistan has changed, and with it the potential risk to the local staff who have worked for the UK Government over the past twenty years [details <u>here</u>].

Changes to the National Transfer Scheme - Changes to the National Transfer Scheme will ensure responsibility for unaccompanied children seeking asylum will be more fairly distributed.

The changes to the scheme, announced by the Home Secretary and Education Secretary today (Thursday 10 June), will encourage more local authorities to take part in a planned schedule for taking into care children who arrive in the UK alone and claim asylum – ensuring all areas in the UK play their part.

The scheme will provide local authorities with increased funding and take into account local pressures on local services. By having a 'rota' of these transfers, the updated scheme will provide regions and local authorities with greater clarity as to the number of children to expect and the timing of those placements, allowing them time to plan ahead and better manage their capacity [details <u>here</u>].

Local Government News



Initial proposals for the 2023 Boundary Review now published - The Boundary Commission for England (BCE) has published its initial proposals for new constituency boundaries [details <u>here</u>].

The 2023 Review of Parliamentary constituencies was formally launched in January this year. The Commission is required to ensure that the number of electors in each constituency is more equal; in

doing so, the number of constituencies in England will increase from 533 to 543. The Commission is undertaking an independent review of all constituency boundaries in England and will present our final recommendations to Parliament by July 2023.

Just under 10% of existing constituencies in England would remain unchanged in the first major overhaul of seat boundaries since 2010.

The proposed changes - due to come into effect in 2023 - include:

- Melton and Syston to become a new seat in Leicestershire
- The return of Rutland and Stamford, previously a constituency back in 1983
- Erewash renamed as Ilkeston and Long Eaton
- Glenfield moved into Leicester West
- Kimberley added to Nottingham North
- South Leicestershire to become Blaby, Oadby and Wigston
- Charnwood renamed as Mid-Leicestershire

The aim of the shake-up is to make Parliament fairer by giving each MP a roughly similar number of voters, the Boundary Commission for England has said.

The proposals will now be subject to consultations, the first of which will run for eight weeks until 2 August.
