
Why?

- Circa 50% of retail buildings were constructed before 1919
- Circa 10,000 conservation areas in England
- 90% of Towns Fund bids have heritage focus
- £6.7bn GVA generated by heritage related activity in 2019





Using cross-sectional and longitudinal local authority data, research concluded that heritage assets are important 'pull' factors influencing business location decisions (Graves et al, 2017)









Planning (Listed Buildings and Conservation Areas) Act 1990

Section 71 – Formulation and publication of proposals for preservation and enhancement of conservation areas.

(1) It shall be the duty of a local planning authority from time to time to formulate and publish proposals for the preservation and enhancement of any parts of their area which are conservation areas.

National Planning Policy Framework (2023)


214. Local planning authorities should assess whether the benefits of a proposal for enabling development, which would otherwise conflict with planning policies but which would secure the future conservation of a heritage asset, outweigh the disbenefits of departing from those policies.


- 30 buildings restored, repaired and enhanced;
- 20 additional buildings improved independently of the THI;
- 5000 square metres of public realm improved;
- Vacant space brought back into use;
- 2,000+ people engaged in events, training and tours;
- Evident change in perceptions 90% agreed most historically important area in 2017, compared to 64% in 2014
- Overall private investment in the area estimated at over £10 million
