


Figure 13: Concept plan for both Chase Park and Crews Hill





#### **New settlements & the role of Local Authorities**

**Broad context** 

NPPF para 73

- Potential of 'Large Scale' development recognised in National policy.
- Govt Garden Communities
   Programme 47 locally led Garden
   Communities (12 Garden Towns and 35 Garden Villages) over
   320,000 homes by 2050.
- Many other large sites/urban extensions
- Planning system has a key role but practice often needs to go beyond 'pure' planning

"The supply of large numbers of new homes can often be best achieved through planning for larger scale development, such as new settlements or significant extensions to existing villages and towns, provided they are well located and designed, and supported by the necessary infrastructure and facilities. Working with the support of their communities, and with other authorities if appropriate, strategic policy-making authorities should identify suitable locations for such development where this can help to meet identified needs in a sustainable way."

#### Council told to withdraw 6,000 homes plan

Tandridge District Council's Local Plan is 'unsound' and should be withdrawn, a planning inspector has told the Surrey local authority.

The Plan involved more than 6,000 new homes, including a garden community with around 4,000 in South Godstone.

Tandridge first submitted 'Our Local Plan: 2033' to the Planning Inspectorate more than four years ago.




#### **Planning Controls & Process**

- Cross boundary, 30-year project
- Colchester Borough, Tendring District and Essex County Councils
- 7,000 9,000 homes, employment, community facilities
- Shared Local Plan 'broad location' then Site Specific DPD
- Strategic Masterplanning & technical work in evidence base

# **Securing infrastructure funding**Sherford New Community

- Policy & permissions in place
- S106 in place but project stalled
- Secured public sector investment:
  - Low Carbon funding £4m
  - Affordable Housing £16m
  - DfT funding £10m
  - Local Infrastructure Fund £20m
- Enabled start on site, delivery of agreed obligations

# Council land control Otterpool Park, Folkestone & Hythe DC

- Land control: 90% Council, 10% Homes England
- Delivery vehicle: Otterpool Park LLP. Objectives:
  - To deliver mixed tenure housing
  - To create a sustainable community offering a good quality of life to residents
  - To follow Garden Town principles to create a green environment
  - To maximise financial returns to the LLP for investment in Council priorities






#### **Ebbsfleet Development Corporation**

# Potential roles for Local Authorities Summary


- New settlements will continue to be part of the solution to the housing crisis
